## From Pastor Bill

“Aware of the grief, violence, and deep pain of our world, we will in 2024 and beyond endeavor to be a community of lament, love, and reconciliation.” (Goal #2 for 2024)

We as a congregation do ministry not just in general, but in a context. And that context is definitely local. Our building’s location on Whitehall Road in North Muskegon shapes what we are about. But our context is not limited to the local scene. We do our ministry in light of what is happening in the world. We have to think globally, as well as locally.

Our ministry occurs in the midst of a time of great violence—in Sudan, Ukraine, and Palestine. Our congregation has been blessed by our relationship with some Ukrainian friends. They have made us more aware of the tragedy that is the war caused by the Russian government. We were blessed by food that they made for us on a couple of occasions. Aware of their pain, we grieve with them.

We’ve developed a special relationship with grieving Palestinian Christians over the past couple of years, in part because of the trips that Paula and I have made to Palestine and Israel, but also because of the historic relationship that ELCA Lutherans have had with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land. The situation in Gaza is horrible. The pain and destruction there are beyond our comprehension. We grieve with our Palestinian friends, and yes, with our Israeli friends who were the victims of Hamas’ horrible violence.

We must advocate for a ceasefire in Gaza. The violence being brought there by Israel is not acceptable. My grieving and my advocating for Palestinians will not end until the war is over, and justice is brought to that land. It is my opinion that Americans must rethink the level of support that Israel is given by our country. When you travel throughout Palestine, you discover the oppression that is brought about by Israeli occupation. As a Christian, I must always stand with the oppressed.

There is much to grieve over these days and much to disagree about. I remain committed to make sure that our community of faith, while able to tell the truth about the injustices of the world, will be a community in which people who disagree about matters of public import can still live together in unity.

Our upcoming election will test that sense of unity. While I remember somewhat the challenges to

I pray for high school students for whom the pressure is mounting to run faster, study harder and kick farther to obtain a scholarship to offset college costs. I pray for students who have thrown in the towel, dropped out of school but are now seeking a GED. And I pray for children in war-torn countries as life as they knew it no longer exists.

Yes, children are on my mind this month and I surmise every month to follow. They are the vulnerable of this world and yet, they will also inherit this world, a world that stands in need of kindness, goodness, justice, unity and peace. So won't you join me in a prayer for the children - all the children?

### ***Loving God,***

Watch over our children as they begin a new school year or enter a new a new phase in life. Bless them with joy at seeing friends and making new friends, excitement at new experiences and a love of learning.

Guide and protect all who learn, replacing fear with joy, anxiety with peace, and tiredness with energy. Give wisdom, patience, and joy to teachers and mentors as they serve their students. Grant all children a safe-haven to grow into the people they were created to be. **Amen.**

Our ministry is, without a doubt, local. But it's also done in light of the bigness of the world and the culture. It's being done in the time of Harris and Trump, the time of Netanyahu and Putin, a time of war and violence. It's during such a time that we grieve and that we pray, "Your kingdom come, O God. End the violence and let justice flow like waters."



## 160 Years...Civil War and First Lutheran

I tend to be a big picture guy!

I know God has been present in all our comings and goings. We, too, are the faithful, able to see in all times that God is at work.

160 years ago, in 1864, the Civil War had been going for three-plus years. Bull Run, Antietam, Gettysburg were in the past. So many had dealt with comings and goings, sadness and hopes. It was just nine months before the war finally came to end and emancipation and freedom were finally possible. In August of 1864, First Lutheran came to be.

More than 90,000 union soldiers were from Michigan and a good number surely were from Muskegon County. One out of five of these soldiers were recent immigrants from Europe. (These soldiers would get some pay and some meals.)

During 1861-1865 immigrants, including Norwegians, came to the United States. Many of these were from the Haugean (a piety movement) Lutheran Church. This group thought they had been pushed around by the state Lutheran Church in Norway. They tended to think their way of life and Christian faith would not get better. They came through Ellis Island or, like my grandparents, to Boston. They would then take trains west to places like Chicago. Also, the Homestead Act of 1862 gave 160 acres to every family, a reality that was very attractive to these newcomers.

A group of fifteen Norwegian Lutherans met on Ottawa Street in Muskegon on August 12, 1864 as the Civil War grew farther south and west, and while victory seemed hopeful. For a short time, the fifteen organized as the Scandinavian Evangelical Lutheran Church. For a brief time they worshipped at Hall and Prospect, just east of Ottawa Street. Danes and Swedes joined them. Civil War stuff prevented the good mission start from growing.

The congregation bought property at Yuba and Giddings and built a new church for \$2200 and it is still there. The Danes and Swedes didn't like the location and moved on. The congregation became the Norwegian Evangelical Lutheran Church. It was located on the north side of Muskegon in what was called Ward One. In 1915, the congregation renamed itself First Evangelical Lutheran Church and pledged every week to have English worship services that even Norwegians attended.

160 years...a war and a new congregation...lots of comings and goings that have included us —the still faithful in 2024. We give thanks for our faithful journey and our 160th anniversary.
